
#### <u>If approved</u>, Prop 1 would build a new...

- Oak Heights Elementary (1967) (Lynnwood)
- College Place Elementary (1969) (Lynnwood)
- Westgate Elementary (1958) (Edmonds)
- College Place Middle (1970) (Lynnwood)
- New 5<sup>th</sup> Middle at Alderwood (Lynnwood)

## The "Why"

- Of our 34 school campuses, **15 were built more than 50 years ago** and haven't been replaced.
- If approved, **Prop. 1 would replace several of these buildings** with new, modern facilities, to ensure all Edmonds School District students have safe and vibrant places to learn.
- Transitioning sixth grade to middle school by 2028 **requires that we build a fifth middle school.**






#### Population Density Where do folks live in our district?

**College Place Elementary (1969)** 




#### Let's **Compare** 1969 with 2022

- Buildings constructed **prior to 1972** *did not observe* a **national building code**.
- Building codes regulate, among other things:
  - Building Occupancy
  - Foundations, wall, and roof construction
  - Fire protection systems (sprinkler system requirements and design)
  - Materials used in construction
  - Means of **egress**
- Health: 55 years vs. 2 years of wear-and-tear, exposure to elements that degrade a building
- Safety:
  - Structural code requirements now vs. 55 years ago.
  - Multiple points of entry vs. 1 or 2 points of entry.
- **Simply put**, a building from the 2000s is a distinctly safer and healthier environment than one from the 1960s.



#### Reason #2 Anticipating Future Growth:

### Registered voters in the ESD increased from ~104,000 to ~109,000 since 2020.

# While COVID contributed to a noticeable decline in student enrollment, there is reason for optimism in the near future.

With the shift to a hybrid workplace environment in many industries, there is a growing trend of individuals moving out of urban cores in favor of the suburbs where rent/mortgage is less expensive.

This growth includes individuals with young families, or who are looking to start a family.

Data shows that 70-80% of the children living within our district footprint end up attending our public schools.

Data also shows that new school facilities are directly responsible for pushing that percentage upward.

#### **Cue...Spruce Elementary** (ESD's newest school)

#### 2023: New Spruce 600+ students

2021: Old Spruce (1966) ~500 students



### <u>Reason #3 :</u> Move 6<sup>th</sup> Grade to MS by 2028.

#### A few things in this case...

- 1. Middle school teachers have specific endorsements to teach specific content. **They are subject-matter experts.**
- 2. Middle schoolers have access to **science labs.**
- 3. A three-year middle school experience provides **more continuity for both students** <u>and</u> **parents.**
- 4. Learning standards are written K-5, 6-8, and 9-12.
- 5. The **practical effect** of what it would mean for a family with a sixth grader **moving from Shoreline to Edmonds.**

### **Q: How Does** This Impact My Pocketbook?

What do Props 1 and 2 really cost?

Beginning next year, a property owner can expect to see a **\$.03** increase to the property tax rate per \$1,000 assessed value.

What does that mean for your pocketbook? A home with an assessed value of \$750,000 today would see a \$22.50 increase to its annual property tax.

**In exchange**, our community would replace four outdated schools, and build a new, fifth middle school. Additionally, several other schools would receive roofing, plumbing, HVAC, heating fixes, among other improvements listed in the previous slides.

Keep in mind that the Edmonds School District has one of the **lowest tax rates in our <u>region</u>**, and the district is only asking for what it needs to maintain technology funding and to replace some of our most outdated schools.

Because Props 1 and 2 define a **fixed** funding amount, the two measures **maintain a stable tax rate.**



\*If approved, Edmonds School District would eliminate the 2021 Capital Levy at the end of 2024 and use bond funding to complete the replacement project on an accelerated schedule.

#### **Historic and Projected Property Tax Rates**

The tax rate is expected to increase to \$2.65 in 2024 due to a decrease in assessed valuation (AV). AV is expected to flatten in 2025 and the tax rate would remain consistent with 2024. There is an inverse relationship between tax rate and assessed valuation.

Tax collections for school districts are different from many other government funding measures which charge by rate, not a capped amount. School District levies and bonds are capped at the amount approved by voters.
